Course Description:

This course is an introduction to the elements, genres, mediums, historic, and stylistic periods of Western Classical music. This course is designed as an overview and survey for those with little or no background in music. It is recommended for those seeking a general education course in the Fine and Performing Arts. A large reading and writing component is required.

- 4). An ability to discern aurally and identify music of different genres, mediums, and styles.
- 5). An ability to research a topic and present a written report.
- 6). Understand history and it's affect on Western music, various composers, and their works.
- 7). Analyze and evaluate written music and musical performances.
- 8). Comprehension of the various elements of music including, melody, harmony, form, structure, style, and other compositional techniques.

Instructional Strategies:

The primary model for instruction will be provided through lecture, discussion, and listening via multi-media presentations, student presentations, and written papers. A large amount of personal reading from the text book will be needed in order to succeed in this course.

Course Requirements:

Students will

- 1). Attend and participate in all classes. Overall grades will be lowered 5 points for **EACH** unexcused absence. There is no substitute for coming to class with all needed materials. - 5). There is no final exam in this course. Instead a final paper of at least ten pages will be due by 5pm on the last day of finals. Paper topic's are to be selected and approved by the joint interest of the instructor and student. A bibliography with at least 3 **BOOK** sources is required.

Grading will consist of the following:

a) Attendance (which can only hurt you)

- c) Two listening exams on Medieval-Classical periods and 19th and 20th centuries: 20%
